The indoor facility closed on Thursday, 21st March,and was replaced by the mobile van on Wednesday 27th March.

However, Wangford Community have objected strongly to their intention to locate the van in the layby outside the church, and they have agreed to move it to the Community Centre car park.

As we feared, there is to be a reduction of 50% in the service provided. Unlike the other outreaches, Wangford will still have 2 visits per week, but on consecutive days, and for only 1 hour each day.

"I love playing in the street and not having to worry about traffic," says Henry (7) during his visit to Milestones Museum in Basingstoke, Hampshire, We're able to go back in time for a day.

In what is little more than an aircraft hangar, streets of Victorian houses and many long gone Hampshire businesses can be found. As we wander round with our helpful audio guides, I ponder whether an architect was employed to design these excellent buildings. There's a tram, an old bus, even a marvellous teddy bear museum, a pub and sweet shop that are open for business during certain hours.

We learn about engineering and in 1915 William Tasker & Sons built a steam traction engine for a customer in Gosport. It's a real eye opener that such a business existed in Hampshire and it is sad that this, as with so many, ceased to survive as the world changed.

Visiting an attraction like Milestones is particularly helpful at this time, I feel. It shows us that change has always

been with us and that you have to adapt to survive. But it does open your eyes to the fact that so very few companies actually last the duration with many being acquired and ultimately forgotten. Milestones is full of such firms including Gales the brewer, which sold out to Fullers in 2006. Webber's the Basingstoke vehicle dealership had traded for over a century and was taken over by Harwoods in 2018. Thornycroft, the vehicle manufacturer lasted until 1977.

Here is an attraction where you can while away the best part of a day. There's time to sit on a bench in the High Street where we enjoy our picnic and savour the surroundings. Our children Harriett (12), Heidi (10) and Henry (7) can roam free without a problem, explore and complete their trail. There's an alleyway through a terrace property. The windows are open and you can overhear a conversation; a man wants his fresh shirt for the dance



tonight. Meanwhile a washerwoman strolls past us, in period attire. We're hoping that she tells us a yarn about her life but unfortunately she questions why our children do not have mobile phones. We weren't expecting that. We had hoped to leave all that nonsense behind for the day. While it's a nice idea that volunteers can dress up and walk around the museum, it would really add to the atmosphere if they actually

got into the part. The sights and sounds enhance our travels back to the 1800s. There's a distant clip clop of horses. I didn't know that there were 20,000 horses in Hampshire before WWII. Then as mechanisation took hold, reliance on our four-legged friends plummeted. I enjoy spending time in the garage and listening

to the conversation between the vicar and the mechanic.

What did you say???

Dear Bugle

Two years ago I was tested for and given NHS hearing aids. They were okay, but when the batteries needed changing, they required fingers more nimble than my 86-y-o ones. My daughter told me how many thousands of pounds it would cost to buy new ones on the High Street. So I Googled rechargeable hearing aids on line. I found some skin-coloured ones advertised at about £40. I read most of the reviews and everyone raved about them. To be fair, almost all came from the US of A and they rave about everything. But then I thought, complete with a USB charging lead they cost £40 - what the hell? So I ordered a pair. They turned up about two or three weeks later.

They come in a little charging unit complete with a USB cable and a pack of rubber cups to suit every size of ear. THEY ARE AMAZING! With the NHS ones, my TV sound is set on about 21/22. With these it is set on 12/13. A huge improvement. Yesterday I returned the NHS ones to Paget. The receptionist had never seen or heard of my replacement hearing aids and was suitably surprised when I showed her my new aids. I have to admit that these skin-coloured ones are my second pair.

A friend told me of a friend of his who everyone was fed up with shouting at. My first pair were white and I didn't like that, so I told him that I had ordered a pair of skin-coloured hearing-aids and they were a pound cheaper than the white ones.

I told him that when the skin-coloured ones arrive, he could have the white one for his friend to see if they would help her. I have handed them over, but have no idea of the result yet because I only see my friend once a week and he similarly see his other friend just once a week. But with the cost on the High Street being what it is, I would encourage readers with hearing problems to invest £40 in these rechargeable aids. Money seriously well spent. Further to the High Street, the replacement rubber cups can <u>only</u> be bought on the High Street if you bought their very expensive hearing aids. I found loads on-line for diddly squit.

ANCIENT WISDOM

Shining a light on life today

CROP CIRCLES: All done with rollers and rope? Not Possible

You have all seen pictures in the press of Crop Circles that cover huge areas and the complexity of design is nothing short of breathtaking. Patterns display anything from a depiction of the Mayan calendar to what appears to be a DNA strand.

Like everything else that comes to us from a higher intelligence or indeed from the world of spirit, Crop Circles have their share of fraudsters, they have their share of debunkers and their share of 'rational explanations'. Of course there are fraudsters making Crop circles but for now, lets concentrate on real Crop

Circles, for, contrary to popular opinion, they are not a relatively new phenomena. They are mentioned in academic texts from the late 17th century and over 200 are reported and recorded prior to 1970. It is fast becoming an undisputed fact that Crop Circles are organised harmonic forms that manifest around the world, the result of an energy interacting with the physical world,





in this case, plants. The energy is comprised of light, sound and magnetism. To date, Crop Circles have been reported in 29 countries and have appeared in mediums such as wheat, barley, canola, trees, ice, rice paddies and even linseed.

Eye witnesses to Crop Circles forming (and there have been a few) speak of shafts of light descending from the sky or the presence of orbs. There is even a photograph of one such incident that has been scientifically examined and proven to be authentic. The shafts of light are clearly visible. So how do we know when a Crop Circle is genuine?

In genuine formations the stems of the wheat, barley etc are not broken but merely bent, normally about an inch off

the ground, near the plant's first node. In special cases the stems are bent about 6 inches from the top of the seed head. Such features defeat the hoax argument, since a plank or garden roller is required to flatten the crop to the ground, resulting in clear damage to the plants. The plants appear to have been subjected to a short and intense burst of heat which softens the stems to drop just above the ground at 90 degrees, where they re-harden to their new and permanent position, without damage! Plant biologists are baffled by this and it is the singlemost method of identifying the real phenomenon. The tremendous application of local heat found at newly created circles is also responsible for altering the local water table as millions of gallons of surface and sub-surface water is evaporated!

Crop Circles also show existence of Ultrasound – sound above the normal hearing range – and such frequencies are known to exist at ancient sites such as stone circles, long burrows, tumuli, dolmens and menhirs. And like all sacred sites, the Crop Circles appear at the intersecting points of the earth's magnetic pathways of energy. Other evidence shows how the floors of laid plants are swirled in mathematical proportions relative to the Golden mean, the fundamental vortex used by nature to create organisms such as shells and sunflowers. The floor of the Crop Circles can have up to five layers of weaving, all in counter-flow to each other, with every seed head intact and placed beside each other as if in a museum case. Genuine Crop Circles are not perfectly round but are slightly elliptical, (a hoax, requiring a central rope cannot effectively achieve this, and never has) Their edges are crisply defined from the flattened crop as if drawn with a compass and incised with surgical precision.

Crop Circles alter the local electro-magnetic field; often compasses cannot locate north, cameras and cellphones malfunction. Local farm animals avoid Crop Circles or simply act agitated hours before one materialises. Crop Circles generally form at night between the hours of 2 and 4am during the shortest evenings of the English year. A lucky few appear to have witnessed large balls of incandescent colour, project a beam of golden light into a field which the next morning displays a new circle.

During a surveillance project in 1989 a Japanese TV crew filmed a Crop Circle manifesting in the early hours of the morning, showing a swirling motion of energy lasting less than 15 seconds.

At Stonehenge in 1996 an RAF pilot declared nothing to report when flying over the area of the monument at 4-15pm. Yet 15 minutes later a second pilot reported a huge 900ft formation resembling the Julie Set computer fractal. Comprising 149 circles and aligned along a spiral curve, it lies within view of the well patrolled monument. It took a team of 11 people, no less than 5 hours to survey the formation. People have experienced strange and yet wonderful sensations when entering a circle to examine it. There are corroborated reports of one investigator who was suffering from a dislocated shoulder and was undergoing weeks of physiotherapy. He spent all day surveying a circle and when he emerged from it his shoulder was completely healed. He is a scientist. His doctor confirmed the recovery. It was not an isola

Jumping on the bandwagon in the late 1980s was a group originally called Team Satan, they later changed their name to Circle Makers. These people claimed responsibility for making Crop circles, and no doubt, they have made a few. There are several Crop circles out there that have been made by the Circle Makers but they are crude and obvious.

They tried to claim responsibility for the 1996 Stonehenge circle mentioned above, despite the fact that two RAF pilots, a gamekeeper and a security guard all claim that the formation appeared within a 15 minute window one Sunday afternoon. Don't forget also, that it took a team of 11 people 5 hours to survey it!! It appears the Circle Makers have a fabulous ability to bend the laws of physics, levitate above the untouched wheat and master the laws of invisibility and make time stand still in order to complete their work! The Circle Makers became the media darlings however and gained lucrative commissions from both the BBC and Sky – even Mitsubishi, for whom they made a Crop Circle shaped like a van! It took them two full days, they did not work at night.

The evidence, both practical and scientific in favour of a higher intelligence being the creators of Crop Circles is overwhelming. Despite this the government and the media continually try to debunk the idea by paying large sums of money to so-called Circle Makers, to commissioning TV programmes and newspaper articles to 'expose all crop circles as frauds'. Large swathes of the public agree with the hoax theory, not because they are influenced by such programmes particularly, but for a far more base reason.

It is man's inability to accept that he is NOT the only intelligent being in the universe. Not only that he is singularly incapable of taking on board the fact that there are vastly more intelligent beings out there. There are over 200 billion stars like our sun in the known universe and it is naivety bordering on crass stupidity not to realise that we cannot be alone.

Maybe these higher evolved beings are trying to tell us something very important, without declaring themselves and therefore removing our free will? Its up to us you see, all they can do is nudge. We should pay attention.



It seems undeniable to even the most dedicated of people who prefer to think otherwise, that there is an inexorable force at work that is radically changing or attempting to change everything that we always, perhaps naively, took for granted.

Freedom of speech, freedom of movement and freedom of opinion are all under threat - you have to watch what you say and do - as society seems to be going utterly mad in denying real science and nature in favour of ideals.

Part of the new '1984' control is the removal of cash from society and it is coming soon - if we let it. Supermarkets have removed staffed check-outs, preferring that you checked yourself out and have your picture taken whilst you stand there, which is added to the wealth of information they are all gathering on their customers.

Primark in Bury St Edmunds recently opened a new store with only one cash till and a line of card payment self checkouts! Subway in Norwich (station) have gone 'touch screen' ordering and card payment. The only person the premises that you actually see is the person who hands you your food. The race to get rid of cash is well underway, to be replaced by government digital currency. No more freedom to spend the cash in your pocket - it won't be there. The bank will hold it all.

The human interaction lost forever - no smiles, no friendly staff to chat to - human contact reduced to a minimum. In an age where human interaction will cease, as robots, according to the tech giants, will replace many if not most jobs, I can only hope that one day in the not to distant future we will realise the importance of human connection.

What do members get?


Our meetings are very varied, offering practical help sessions, competitions, talks by guest speakers, photography and image editing tutorials, indoor and outdoor photography sessions.

In February over twenty visitors and members of the Alde Valley Suffolk Family History Group were in the Fromus Centre in Saxmundham, to be joined by another fifteen members on Zoom, to hear Dr Colin Chapman talk about Family History and Education Records.

Dr Chapman began with an overview of resources available to a family historian, then he took us back to the very early schools: St Paul's School in London was founded in 1125 by the Bishop of London, Richard Beaumais. Winchester College was founded by William Wykeham in 1382 and its statutes date from 1400. The purpose of these schools was teaching children on spiritual matters.

Henry VIII established many educational institutions from the proceeds of the Dissolution of the Monasteries between 1536 and 1541. However, these funds did not always get to the schools. Edward VI followed his father's example and founded King's School in York and Newland Grammar School.

Following that, merchants who had made their fortunes in London often made endowments to set up schools. For example, Lawrence Sheriff set up Rugby public school. Alde Valley Academy in Leiston is run by the Trust that administers Sir John Leman High School in Beccles. John Leman was a wealthy merchant from Beccles who established this school in 1631.

Colin showed us pictures of early classrooms, typically several classes being taught at once in the

same room. Teachers would use a switch as punishment: both practices lasted until Victorian times. He emphasised that girls as well as boys attended school.

In 1698, the Charity School Movement began. Known as hospitality schools, they provided board and lodging for poor pupils, who wore coats of distinctive colours to identify them (and also make it easy to trace them if they absconded).

In 1811, the first National Schools were founded for Church of England pupils. Non-conformist parents generally sent their children to Lancastrian Schools, which used the Monitorial System of Joseph Lancaster, a Quaker. There were often both types of schools in large towns and cities.

Parish schools in the 19th century were free to attend for both boys and girls. However, they were very often taken out of school at the age of 5 or 6 to start helping in the home or earning a wage, however small. Thus they couldn't practice the reading and writing that they had learnt.

Colin closed by recommending more useful sources. Angie Skelcher.

SOUTHWOLD WILDLIFE TRUST

The March meeting of the Blyth Valley and Southwold Suffolk Wildlife group welcomed Rupert Masefield, from the Suffolk Wildlife Trust, to tell us about the local Kittiwake project. Many people will be aware of the great numbers of kittiwakes nesting in Lowestoft, and Rupert discussed both the bonus of a nature success story, and the nuisance that this abundance of birdlife has brought with it.

Kittiwakes are of the gull family, but they are smaller, and spend their winters in the harsh north west Atlantic waters. They come ashore in spring to nest, usually on tiny cliff ledges, and raise their two chicks.

They feed exclusively on fish and sand eels, and each parent takes it in turn to fly out to sea for food, covering huge distances over three to four days.

Kittiwakes are in serious decline globally, but numbers are increasing in Suffolk, and Lowestoft has become a centre of breeding. No-one really knows why, but

kittiwakes first started to move into the town in the 1950's, and their numbers have continued to increase. The smell of large amounts of guano, and the noise of so many birds, has caused a nuisance to town dwellers, and over the years many measures have been tried to persuade kittiwakes to leave public buildings, and move to artificial sites. However, some measures, such as netting, were potentially harmful to the birds. As a result, the Suffolk Wildlife Trust has brought together local interest groups to form the Lowestoft Kittiwake Partnership, aiming to find safe solutions. There is to be a Kittiwake Officer who will work with local people and businesses to keep kittiwakes safe and reduce the problems with nesting on buildings.

The offshore 'kittiwake hotels' you may have seen, were constructed by a windfarm company as mitigation measures for sea birds. Decoy kittiwakes are being used to encourage nesting activity, and it is hoped that with time, these will be inhabited by these attractive but vulnerable birds.

Our next meeting is on Thursday, April 11th, 7.30pm, at the Southwold Arts Centre, IP18 6JP. There will be a brief AGM, followed by a film, 'Secret Rivers – the Waveney, part two', featuring Paul Heiney.
